FINAL REPORT **SUBMITTED TO MWE**

Thea Trussler, Interim Coordinator of the Women's Centre, finalized and submitted a final report to the Ministry of Women's Equality this week summarizing work completed during the past three months. The report addressed issues of concern including financial and staffing stability of the West Kootenay Women's Association, and summarized the results of an internal review conducted during March by our consultant Julie Garrison.

A new balanced budget has been submitted to MWE based on the current level of funding. Due to a Draw Winners* number of factors including the Congratulations new funding received from the BC Gaming Commission to hire a volunteer coordinator, donations 1st prize package: DONNA MCDONALD members of the 2nd prize package: FELICE DAVIS, and new lower monthly mortgage payments, WKWA will be financially stable for the upcoming fiscal year.

> New viable job descriptions are underway for two coordinating

positions: an administrative Women's Centre Coordinator and a people-oriented Volunteer Coordinator. The administrative coordinator will focus on creating written policies and procedures and an administrative infrastructure for the Women's Centre, with the goal of enabling the centre to be run by a single coordinator if funding for a second coordinator is not available in future years.

The internal review identified a number of areas which will require attention in the upcoming months. Among them are: Women's Centre healthwisefety, accountabile ity, and liability, and the creation of communication and confidentiality policies and procedures. Work on these policies and procedures has already begun, and draft policies have been reviewed by the CC and submitted to MWE.

Plans are underway for a health and safety audit in April, and, a new policy for conducting criminal record checks for staff and volunteers is being implemented.

The hiring of a second coordinator will enable work to begin on recruiting new volunteers, training volunteers and the Coordinating Collective, developing new programs and support groups, fundraising, and ongoing review of current services.

Based on this work, a new workable contract will be created with MWE for continued funding of WKWA.

WKWA Financial Report

Strong support was received by the membership to keep the house at 420 Mill Street A new 1 year open mortgage has been negotiated with the Nelson & District Credit Union with an exceptional interest rate of 8.25%. A lump sum paydown was made to the principal of approximately \$7000 (thanks to about \$3600 received in lump sum donations and some retroactive rent for the 1999 fiscal year received from the BC Gaming Commission). Our monthly mortgage payments have now decreased by about \$100.

Our new fiscal year began as of April 1,2000, and a new viable budget has been submitted to MWE.

Thanks to all members who contributed to our recent fundraising efforts. Recent support has enabled us to eliminate our deficit. Fundraising efforts will continue as WKWA require ongoing community support in order to function.

Updated job descriptions are currently underway for two coordinator positions. The CC is working to have both coordinators in place on or before July 1, 2000.

One position is funded by the Ministry for Women's Equality (MWE) for 28 hours per week. The job description for this coordinator will primarily focus on administrative tasks related to running the Women's Centre and establishing administrative policies and procedures for the centre.

The second position is funded by the BC Gaming Commission for 26 hours per week for 40 weeks. This person will be responsible for volunteer coordination, recruitment and training, as well as community outreach for the Women's Centre and WKWA.

A hiring committee is currently being formed, and additional help is needed. Please contact the Women's Centre if you're interested in becoming a member of the hiring committee.

LIBRARY REPORT by Heather McSwan

One of the books I'm reading is Naomi Wolfs Fire with Fire, an excellent book published in 1993 - as is usual for me, I'm either ahead of the times or behind, rarely in synch.

I haven't finished it all, but I will, and recommend it to anyone. I thought the subtitle The New Female Power & How it will Change the 21st Century was somewhat farreaching. However, she proposes a changed way of looking and thinking, and examines previous evolutions of feminism. She speaks of "power feminism" and provides a documented basis upon which to build a more encompassing form of feminism "Wolf offers concrete strategies for a revitalized, positive, and inclusive brand of feminism that does not divide women by class or sexual orientation." An extremely thought-provoking book that spoke to what I needed to hear, and also what I didn't want to hear. Suggested reading for anyone.
