41. These questions aren't meant to be insulting. THEY REPRESENT A GENUINE CURIOSITY AND CONFUSION about why a woman would want to do 'a man's work'.

GRAPHIC: WOMAN WITH HARD-HAT IMAGINING A CREW OF MEN.

42. This is the first myth that women face in tradesland: "Women can't do the same kinds of jobs as men."

MYTH CARD: "WOMEN CAN'T DO THE SAME KINDS OF JOBS AS MEN."

43. Another myth: "Women only work until they get married." Trades—women with years of experience in their field are still judged on marital status.

MYTH CARD: "WOMEN ONLY WORK UNTIL THEY GET MARRIED."

44. Another common interview question is "How much do you weigh?" The question is based on the myth that women don't have the physical strength and endurance to do trades work.

MYTH CARD: "WOMEN DON'T HAVE THE PHYSICAL STRENGTH AND ENDURANCE."

45. A fourth myth is that women need special facilities on an all-male work site... And, of course, every tradeswoman's all-time favourite interview question is.....

MYTH CARD: "WOMEN NEED SPECIAL FACILITIES PARTICULARLY ON AN ALL-MALE WORK SITE."

57. Every woman is under intense scrutiny in the trades, especially when there's only one of them.

Some bosses have stated directly "do well, or we'll never hire another woman".

58. A tradeswoman face all of these challenges. Plus her own eagerness to succeed and not to let down the employer who finally...

60. But a good instructor or employer will help her accept that no one learns without making mistakes.

73. Women have been less exposed to this form of feedback. They have to learn not to take yelling and demonstrative anger personally.

74. When somebody yells at you, most often he's yelling at what you did, not at who you are.

75. There's a certain amount of initial testing that goes on in any trades work. Crew members may harass a woman as a way of finding out

76. how she's going to behave, what kind of a person she is, and how they should behave around her.

77. They may send her out to look for a 'sky hook', or devise other harmless initiation rites.

GRAPHIC: MAN SENDS WOMAN FOR SKY HOOK.

78. If women are prepared, these traditions can be fun and can quickly make her feel like part of the team ... and that she's cared for.

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79. Sometimes joking can get out of hand and develop into a form of sexual harassment. Women and their employers can learn to deal with this quietly and assertively.

GRAPHIC: SEXUAL HARASSMENT.

80. Embarassment or shyness has often prevented women or their supervisors from dealing directly with situations of harassment.

81. A few women have quietly quit their jobs and employers have lost top women workers

82. for fear of confronting the issue; whereas a case of physical assault on the work site between two men would be dealt with swiftly.

83. These are areas where men and women need to dialogue openly and honestly -- both on the work site and in training and counselling situations.

Women and men work on site.

84. Women are in the paradoxical position of being a "lady" in a "man's world". But men swear. Should tradeswomen swear?

85. Many do -- and well! It's a quick way to express frustration and anger.

86. And for both men and women, sometimes it's appropriate and sometimes it's not.

If a woman asks for help on an awkward load, as every tradesperson does at times, she may be thought of as soft or weak. Woman lifting log alone. 88. But if she doesn't ask for help then her male co-workers may think she's trying to show them up. 89. And to complicate matters, if a Woman and man with shovel. man insists upon helping a woman when she doesn't want or need help, she'll be resented for her strength if she refuses... 90. But she may be resented for her Woman and man with shovel. weakness if she accepts. 91. It's all tied up into our elusive Men and women working on log. and complex expectations of what's male and what's female. What's a man's job and what's a woman's job? 92. None of us is immune to these Woman car painter. stereotypes and all of us are challenged with freeing ourselves from them.

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93. On any job, almost without exception, there are individual men who are supportive and fair in their treatment of women in the crew. They're bravely bucking hundreds of years of tradition.
