After a tasty breakfast (included in the weekend price) festival goers were treated to a host of workshops. Popular o included Women & Globalization, Tai Chi, Cultural Appropriation, Body Printing, Astrology, Pine-needle Baskets and Drumming and Dances of Universal Peace.

Frequently heard, says Jill, were wails of "It's so hard to choose between them," when two great workshops were scheduled back to back.

Women swam, ate, talked and reminisced, she recalls. "Kids played at the free daycare, and the potluck supper was bountiful and delicious."

That night, Calgary dance band Maud rocked the crowd with their hot dance music, and local drummers joined in. While it poured outside, things were warm and jubilant inside.

Sunday brought sunny skies and another round of morning workshops. Women from Victoria, Saskatchewan, Oregon, Washington and all over the Kootenays massaged, sewed, danced, sang, wrote, and shared with each other.

The Sunday literary cabaret was packed, varied and colourful. While

Women invited to talk about life from their view

Following program cuts and funding decreases, women in Columbia Basin communities are suffering from increases in poverty, unemployment and lack of equality.

With this in mind, the Columbia Basin Trust Women's Committee wants to hear the stories of women in communities throughout the Basin to learn more about the struggles many women face.

Through a grant from Status of Women Canada, the committee now has funding to pay for women to come and talk about their experiences of poverty, unemployment and lack of equality at a workshop in Cranbrook on September 21 and 22.

Any women wishing to attend are eligible for financial assistance with transportation, accommodation and childcare, and will be welcomed to give input for the development of an action plan. The plan will implement gender based analysis — looking at the role of women in society in the context of their gender. Women participants will also be updated about what kind of funding can be accessed from the Columbia Basin Trust, within Basin communities.

If you're interested in participating in this consultation please contact Hannah at 3 52-3 609. Details of location and agenda will be forwarded to you along with confirmation of your participation.

Hannah is working on a short-term contract as the project coordinator for the Columbia Basin Ad Hoc Committee. The committee's goals are gaining public understanding for equality, and ensuring that the Columbia Basin Trust has a grasp of the effects on women's lives when they distribute the trust funds. The Columbia Basin Trust was set up to to compensate affected communities for the impact building hydro dams in this region has had on people's lives.

on the Employment Equity Front...

I am deep into data, swimming through statistics to put together some "baseline" information on employment equity in the region. Statistics tend to draw you into a whirlpool of meaningless numbers so I'm careful to stay afloat. I'll emerge with a summary in the fall.

In the meantime, I've put together an advisory committee - a resource of 14 people, mostly women, who play key roles in the community and care about employment equity. I am aiming for broad representation throughout the region and a broad range of employment sectors, including economic development, business, industry, labour, local government, education, training, community health, social services and grassroots organizations.

Up to this point much of my work has been to do with the Keenleyside project, as well as background study for the project as a whole. The advisory committee I mentioned will help shape the EE project by providing experienced advice on what avenues are likely best to pursue.

I've been following up with Columbia Power Corporation and others about the Keenleyside project. We've asked them to implement a new position at the dam, a women's equity coordinator, as well as an equity integration committee with a paid women's advocate. I'll keep you posted on their response.

All this is laying the groundwork for activities in the fall that I'll tell you lots about in the next issue of the Women's News.

Ruth is working on a two-year contract for WKWA, funded by Status of Women Canada to further opportunities for equal employment opportunities in the region.


Beginnings



The West Kootenay Women's Association's Coordinating Collective (CC) is a progressive, grassroots women's group, similar to a board, but operating on consensus-based decision making model.


The CC has a conflict resolution policy, shares facilitation and strives to take an active role in community development.

Currently WKWA is developing long-term structures that will ensure we'll be here for a long time to come, and will run in a healthy, open style. Diversity is embraced. Women from all walks of life are invited to participate.

Having a voice on the collective means sharing ideas with a broad range of women who bring their energy to making the communities in the region vital and supportive for women — through working for employment equity, operating the women's centre, or developing policy that coninues to strive for equal opportunity for girls and women.

Women's News goes tree free

The newsletter you are holding has no wood products in it. Feel it. Nice, eh? It's Ecosource Paper made from flax, hemp, and cotton. We ordered a few reams of ir last spring when our paper reusing zeal at the Centre created a surplus in our office supplies budget. We won't necessarily be able to afford continuing to buy tree-free but it's good to try it out and think about our paper use.

This particular paper comes from Eastern Europe but Ecosource's President, Odette Kolman is eagerly looking for North American sources of treefree paper. Perhaps now that hemp cultivation is on the rise, this will become possible.

One of the obvious reasons is the damage extensive logging and pulp production causes to our environment. Chlorine, a product used in pulp production, has been clearly linked to breast cancer, for one. And if breast

Another reason is that treefree paper simply makes sense. Hemp is a fast growing, hardy, agricultural product and yields a lot of fibre. One U.S. estimate says that 1% of U.S.agricultural land would provide for all their paper needs. Hemp fibres also make good, strong, acid-free


