### CURRENT PROJECTS OF THE SPONSOR

### NELSON WOMEN'S CENTRE

FUNDING SOURCE: Secretary of State, Women's Program CONTRACT: Renewed annually for past nine years

The Centre is run by a full-time, paid coordinator who, with a large team of volunteers, provides information, referral services, advocacy, crisis intervention and support for women.

It responds to needs identified in the community by providing workshops to allow skill-sharing and by offering programs in conjunction with other agencies in the area. The Centre houses a feminist lending library, a photocopier, a free used clothing collection and small meeting area for women.

An extensive collection of current resource material on matters of interest to women is maintained in readily accessible files.

The Centre is affiliated with local, provincial and national networks of women. It serves women in the West Kootenay region, many of whom are both low-income and single parents.

### THE ADVOCACY PROJECT

FUNDING SOURCE: The Law Foundation of British Columbia CONTRACT: Renewed for a second year April 1989.

This project assists individuals, groups and non-profit societies who are in conflict with more powerful systems or individuals, to protect their legal and human rights.

The staff person provides information, referral, one-on-one advocacy and clients are taught problem-solving skills, assertiveness and self-representation for use in court and at tribunals.

The staff person travels throughout the region offering advocacy clinics and workshops on topics such as welfare rights, custody and access and assertiveness training.

The project provides input for law reform and government policy review and maintains a small library.

In its first year the project had an average monthly caseload of forty and referral requests have been about one hundred per month. Ten volunteers have been involved during the first year.

#### KOOTENAY WOMENWORKS

FUNDING SOURCE: Canadian Job Strategies Operations Canada Employment and Immigration CONTRACT: Renewed annually since 1986

With a staff of three full-time women this project conducts employment training programs for classes of eight to ten women who have been defined as "severely employment disadvantaged". These are women from all walks of life from 20 to 60 years old. There are three classes each year.

In the initial eight weeks of classroom training, participants are taught communications skills, assertiveness training, interview skills, resume writing, introduction to the word processor and more. Classroom training is designed to build confidence and self esteem in proparation for entering the workforce.

After the classroom training, participants work for eight weeks with an employer of their choice. This on the job training matches the participant's interest and skills with the needs of the employer and provides specific skill training, local references and ongoing employement.

Approaching the end of the third year of funding, the project has graduated 78 women and meets the national standards of the Federal program.

### BATTERED WOMEN'S RESEARCH PROJECT

FUNDING SOURCE: Secretary of State, Women's Program CONTRACT: Seven Weeks

There was speculation that women in rural areas, ethnic women and disabled women were not served by existing sources intended to help women in battering situation.

The objective of this short project was to document the resources available in this area; to determine which women were being served and thus identify those not reached at this time. The project also attempted to suggest how new services or resources could be made available.

The printed report of the work is to be released April 14th, 1989.
